# Where Nature and History Live On Goto Island, Nagasaki Prefecture

Located in the southwestern part of the Goto Islands at the westernmost tip of Kyushu, the enchanting island of Goto is blessed with cobalt-blue seas, white sand beaches, and year-round opportunities for fishing and marine sports. It's also home to a UNESCO World Cultural Heritage site, "Hidden Christian Sites in the Nagasaki and Amakusa Region," which tells the story of the area's Christian history.

### **Goto Islands**

The Goto Islands consist of approximately 150 islands, large and small, off the western coast of Nagasaki Prefecture.

The southern three of the five main islands—Fukue Island, Hisaka Island, and Naru Island—along with the surrounding islands are collectively known as Shimogoto ("lower goto").

Rich in untouched nature, these islands feature breathtaking landscapes and pristine beaches. They're easily accessible from Nagasaki—just about 30 minutes by plane or approximately 1 hour and 30 minutes by jetfoil.

With a mild annual average temperature of 17°C, the islands offer a comfortable climate year-round, making any season the perfect time to visit. Even if it's just to enjoy the sea or savor delicious island cuisine, make sure to experience the many charms of the Goto Islands!

# **Goto Islands Geopark**

### (Shimogoto area)

The Goto Islands (Shimogoto Area) Geopark, which was designated in 2022, is recognized for its diverse geological heritage, showcasing the formation of the Japanese archipelago, thick sedimentary layers of continental origin, and fault lines and volcanic activity that shaped the Goto Islands.

# Mt. Onidake

Mt. Onidake, a volcano that erupted approximately 18,000 years ago, is one of Goto Island's most iconic landmarks. With its smooth, rounded shape, the mountain is surrounded by vast grasslands from spring to summer. In late summer, tiger lilies bloom, while in autumn, gentians and silver grass transform the landscape, making it a beloved relaxation spot for locals. Every three years, a controlled burn is conducted, creating a scene reminiscent of the volcano's ancient eruptions. Kamiozu-cho, Goto-shi



Geopark components



The East China Sea stretches between Japan and the Asian continent. The Goto Islands were originally connected to the continent, just like the rest of the Japanese archipelago. The foundation of the Goto Islands is known as the Goto Group, a geological formation composed primarily of sand and mud from the continent that is estimated to have accumulated 22 to 18 million years ago. When the Japanese archipelago separated from the continent, the Goto Islands remained connected to the mainland until the final stages of Japan's formation, making them an important site for studying the birth of the Japanese islands. Around 7 million years ago, northwest-southeast fissures appeared, splitting the landmass into five islands to create the prototype of today's Goto Islands. Subsequent volcanic eruptions further shaped the landscape, forming lava plateaus and numerous volcanic islands. Due to their unique geology, topography, and location, the Goto Islands are home to a rich ecosystem and abundant marine life. In addition, their proximity to the continent has had a significant historical and cultural impact, which is evident in the area's connections to the Kentoshi missions (Japanese envoys to Tang China), Wako pirates, and hidden Christians. The geopark consists of "geosites" (geological

and topographical features), "natural sites" (geological accession of the second sites and topographical features), "natural sites" (historical and cultural landmarks), all of which are the subject of preservation and use.

### Osezaki Tamanoura

Located at the westernmost point of Fukue Island, Osezaki juts out into the East China Sea as a massive 100-meter-high cliff formed from the Goto Group geological formation. Along with its lighthouse, this dramatic cliff is a well-known tourist attraction. Additionally, from mid-September to early October, visitors can witness the migration of crested honey buzzards as they journey toward the continent.

### Sagano Island cliff formed by marine volcanic eruptions Miiraku

Sagano Island was formed by the fusion of two volcanoes, Mt. Odake in the north and Mt. Medake in the south. With a circumference of approximately 12 km, the entire island consists of lava and tuff. Erosion has carved away both volcanic craters on the western coast, making it a rare and scientifically valuable geological site. The island features a 4-kilometer nature trail as well as Mt. Medake Crater Observatory, which offers a clear cross-sectional view of the island's geological layers from land. Saganoshima, Miiraku-machi, Goto-shi

### Abunze Visitor Center Fukue

Serving as both a national park visitor center and the main facility for the Goto Islands (Shimogoto Area) Geopark, this facility introduces various aspects of the Goto Islands through video, dioramas, and panels. It also hosts events such as nature observation tours and workshops utilizing natural materials.

### Abunze Lava Coast Fukue

Formed by lava flows from Mt. Onidake and Mt. Hinotake approximately 50,000 years ago, the rugged black volcanic coastline stretches for 7 kilometers. Located at the southernmost point of Fukue Island, the area is home to many tropical plant species, creating a landscape that resembles Hawaii. Visitors can enjoy the Abunze Visitor Center, and observation deck as well as walking trails that offer stunning views of this unique coastal scenery.

### Senjojiki, Shutogashima Naru

Located about 40 minutes by ferry from Fukue Port on Naru Island, this area features a flat rock formation known as Senjojiki, which stretches from Shutogashima Beach to a small offshore island. The small island is composed of hardened magma, which forms a shield that protects the coastline from rough waves. As a result, the area has been preserved from erosion, leaving behind flat, plateau-like terrain.

### Coastal plants in Hassakubana Kishiku

Hassakubana is home to beaches and tidal flats formed by the accumulation of sand, gravel, and mud over lava flows from past volcanic eruptions. Despite its small area, the site is home to about one-third of the coastal plant species found in Nagasaki Prefecture, making it an exceptionally valuable ecological habitat.

### Kankoro mochi

The traditional local sweet kankoro mochi is made by combining sun-dried sweet potatoes with glutinous rice. When grilled over a hearth or toasted, it becomes fragrant and delicious! Served hot with ice cream, it becomes a versatile sweet treat that makes the perfect dessert!

### Grilled misoyaki-style boxfish

The boxfish is an adorable fish with a comical face and flapping pectoral fins. This rare delicacy is prepared by butterflying the fish, removing its organs, and filling it with a flavorful mixture of barley miso, sake, green onions, and sweet sake, which is then grilled and combined with the flesh.

### Kue Nabe: King of hotpots

Kue, or longtooth grouper, is in season from autumn through winter. This thick, tender white fish makes for an exceptional hotpot. Its gelatin-rich skin and meat are packed with collagen, and the flavorful broth makes a delicious rice porridge at the end of the meal.

### What's ago-dashi?

In Goto, ago-dashi is everyone's go-to soup stock! Ago means "flying fish" in the local dialect, which is sun-dried to create a golden-colored broth with a distinct aroma. It leaves a deep umami flavor in the mouth and perfectly complements udon noodles. It's also delicious as a snack on its own or paired with sake.



One of Japan's three great udon noodle varieties, alongside Sanuki and Inaniwa udon, Goto hand-made udon noodles is a Goto specialty. Made with Goto's coastal breezes and ideal climate, it's finished with locally produced camellia oil for a smooth, silky texture.

### Goto Beef steak

Raised in Goto's lush natural setting and mild climate, Goto Beef is known for its perfect marbling, juicy meat, and subtle sweetness. This premium Wagyu Beef is so rare that it's often called "phantom Goto Beef."

# Ise-ebi (Japanese spiny lobster)

In autumn, fresh ise-ebi is one of Goto's most prized seasonal delicacies. Grilled or in miso soup, the springy, succulent texture of this shellfish is a true gift from Goto's ocean currents.

### Sashimi platter

### Goto yellowtail

The spread of Christianity in Goto began in the 16th century. It was initiated when the 18th ruler of the Goto domain, Uku Sumisada, asked Jesuits based in the Omura domain to send a Western doctor to treat his illness. After his recovery, Christian missionary work expanded, and the 19th ruler, Uku Sumitaka, was baptized as a devoted believer. However, Christianity was banned in 1614, leading to the persecution and exile of Christians, many of whom became martyrs. As a result, it became increasingly difficult for believers to continue practicing their faith. Despite this challenge, devout followers became "hidden Christians" and continued their prayers in secret.

Around the 18th century, Goto faced a number of crises, including in the form of famine and disease, which led to a significant decline in the farming population, making agricultural production difficult. At the same time, the Omura domain was implementing strict population control measures and working to expel hidden Christians. To address these mutual interests, an agreement was made to relocate farmers from the Omura domain (in what is now the Sotome district of the city of Nagasaki) to Goto. Ultimately, around 3,000 people migrated to Goto, most of them hidden Christians.

These believers settled in the island's harsh mountainous regions and steep terrain and endured sustained oppression while continuing their faith in secrecy. Finally, the ban on Christianity was lifted in 1873, allowing the believers to exercise their newfound religious freedom by building a series of churches in their communities.

### Yosuke Tetsukawa's contribution to church architecture

Yosuke Tetsukawa, who learned church construction knowledge and techniques from missionaries such as Father de Rotz, who was instrumental in building Oura Church in Nagasaki, played a significant role in church architecture during his involvement in the construction of over 50 churches, including by overseeing the design and construction of more than 30 of houses of worship, primarily in Nagasaki Prefecture. Over time, construction methods evolved from wooden structures to brick, stone, and reinforced concrete buildings, earning Tetsukawa a high level of recognition in the history of modern Japanese architecture. Churches in Goto include Egami Church, Mizunoura Church, Kusuhara Church, Dozaki Church, and Hiyamizu Church.

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# Egami Church

Located on the western side of Naru Island, Egami Church is accessible by a 30- to 45-minute ferry ride from Fukue Port on Fukue Island. This white wooden church, which was built in 1918, appears almost hidden among the trees. Its charming exterior features white walls with blue-framed windows, and its elevated flooring was designed to prevent moisture buildup. Inside, the church follows a three-aisled structure with a rib-vaulted ceiling. Features such as wooden columns adorned with hand-painted woodgrain patterns created using combs and stained glass windows decorated with hand-drawn yellow flower petals give the sanctuary a handcrafted and intimate feel. Recognized as one of the masterpieces of renowned church architect Yosuke Tetsukawa, Egami Church stands as an exceptionally well-crafted wooden church and has been designated as an Important Cultural Property by the Japanese government.

## A house of prayer made possible by religious freedom

For over two centuries, the Christian faith endured and was preserved despite strict bans on the religion. This unparalleled history was recognized in 2018 when it was inscribed as a World Heritage site under the title "The Hidden Christian Sites in the Nagasaki and Amakusa Region." Two properties in Goto have been included in the designation.

# **Former Gorin Church**

A ferry ride of about 20 minutes from Fukue Port takes you to Tanoura Port on Hisaka Island, followed by a 40- to 50-minute drive to reach the Former Gorin Church on the island's eastern side. Originally built in 1881 as Hamawaki Church, the building was relocated to its current location in 1931 at the insistence of the Christian community in Gorin. While the exterior resembles a traditional Japanese house, the interior follows a three-aisled layout and features a wooden rib-vaulted ceiling, a Gothic-style altar, and other elements of authentic church architecture, creating a striking contrast. Through the pointed-arch wooden-framed windows, visitors can enjoy a breathtaking view of the sea, and the building recently has attracted attention as the model location for an anime film.

# Exploring the island's places of prayer

Goto City is home to several churches and historical sites that tell the story of religious persecution, including Dozaki Church, the first church built in Goto.

### 39 Dozaki Church Fukue

After the ban on Christianity was lifted, Father Marmand built the first wooden church at the site. Later, Father Pélu oversaw the construction of the current beautiful brick church. Currently, the church serves as a Christian museum, showcasing exhibits on the history of persecution and related artifacts. 2019 Dozaki, Okuura-cho, Goto-shi



### 50 Imochiura Church Tamanoura

Imochiura Church, the first Romanesque-style church in Goto, was founded by French missionary Father Pélu. The Lourdes grotto on the church grounds, which was built on Father Pélu's initiative, is known as Japan's first Lourdes. It attracts many pilgrims from across the country. **1243 Tamanoura, Tamanoura-machi, Goto-shi** 



### Mizunoura Church Kishiku

Mizunoura Church is the largest wooden church in Goto. Designed by Yosuke Tetsukawa, the elegant white building features a magnificent rib-vaulted ceiling and vibrant stained glass windows. Kaitsu Church was originally built as a wooden structure by the descendants of Christians who migrated from the Omura domain (in what is now the Sotome district of the city of Nagasaki). The current building underwent extensive renovations due to aging, and its vibrant stained glass windows now shine beautifully.

# **Japan Heritage** Iki, Tsushima, and the Goto Islands— Japan's Ancient Bridge to Asia

The Japan Heritage designation, which is granted by the Agency for Cultural Affairs, is conceived to highlight stories that convey Japan's culture and traditions through the historical and regional charm of different areas.

The first such area to receive this designation was "Iki, Tsushima, and the Goto Islands-Japan's Ancient Bridge to Asia."

This recognition sheds light on Goto's long history of trade with the continent

The island nation of Japan consists of 14,125 islands of varying sizes. Among them, Nagasaki Prefecture, located at the westernmost part of Japan, has the highest number of islands—1,479 in total. The islands of Tsushima and Iki, which are closest to the continent, have a long history of trade with the Korean Peninsula and other regions dating back to ancient times. The Goto Islands, which extends into the East China Sea, also played a crucial role as a maritime gateway to the continent, and many Japanese envoys to Tang China set sail from Goto on journeys known as "Kentoshi missions."

During the Nara and Heian periods, the Tang dynasty (in what is now China) was the most advanced civilization in East Asia. Starting in 630, Japan dispatched a total of about 20 Kentoshi missions to study the political systems, culture, and laws of Tang China over a period of more than 260 years. The missions aimed to learn from the Tang dynasty's advanced governance system, culture, and legal codes. In addition, Buddhism was seen as a means to enrich the nation, and envoys were tasked with bringing back Buddhist scriptures.

Each delegation included a diverse group of people representing different occupations, including ambassadors, monks wishing to study abroad, doctors, carpenters, and large numbers of sailors. Such voyages to the continent were extremely dangerous, and many ships were lost in violent storms due to the underdeveloped shipbuilding technology of the time and the lack of navigational tools like compasses, making travel to China a life-risking endeavor. Despite these hardships, the scholars and monks who returned from China played a crucial role in spreading new knowledge and culture throughout Japan.

# Tracing sites connected to the Kentoshi missions

The 2015 Japan Heritage designation, "Iki, Tsushima, and the Goto Islands—Japan's Ancient Bridge to Asia," highlights the border islands' unique history and culture, which were shaped by exchanges and trade with the Korean Peninsula and the Chinese continent.

These islands—Iki, Tsushima, and Goto—hold the stories of Japan's borderlands. Four cultural properties in the city of Goto have been included in this designation.



### Heritage property 1

### Miiraku (Mimiraku-no-shima)

Located at the westernmost edge of Japan, Goto served as the last port of call before crossing the East China Sea on the journey to Tang China during the era of the Kentoshi missions. The Hizen no Kuni Fudoki ("Records of Hizen Province") refers to this area as Mineraku-no-Saki, and nearby is a historical site known as Fuzengawa, which is believed to be the well that supplied drinking water to the Kentoshi ships. In Kashiwazaki Park in Miiraku-machi stands Jihongai Monument. The characters used to write the name in Japanese mean "the edge of Japan" and "to depart," symbolizing the determination of those setting sail as if to affirm, "We now risk our lives as we leave the final shores of Japan." In the year 804, the monk Kukai embarked on his journey to China from this very place.

# Main hall, Myojoin Temple

One of the oldest temples in Goto, Myojoin Temple's main hall stands with dignity in a landscape of vast rural scenery. It is said that when the monk Kukai stopped at this temple on his way back from Tang China in 806, he saw the morning star shining in the eastern sky as a good omen and named the temple Myojo-an ("Bright Star Hermitage"). The temple served as the prayer temple for the Goto feudal rulers for generations. Its main hall was rebuilt in 1778 with a coffered ceiling adorned with 121 vividly colored paintings of flowers and birds, created by artists of the Kano school. At the four corners of the ceiling are mythical Kalavinka birds, while the center panel alone features a striking ink painting of a dragon. The overwhelming beauty of these paintings draws visitors in and makes them feel as if they are being absorbed into the artwork itself.

### •Heritage property 3 Daiho-ji Temple

Daiho-ji Temple, said to have been founded in 701 by the monk Doyu of the Sanron school, is known as one of the oldest temples in Japan and was designated as an imperial prayer temple by Empress Jito, the 41st emperor of Japan. Later, the monk Kukai is believed to have landed near Daiho-ji Temple upon returning from Tang China. According to legend, he preached the teachings of Shingon esoteric Buddhism here for the first time in Japan. Because of this historical connection, Daiho-ji Temple is sometimes called the "Koyasan of the West," in reference to Koyasan, the head temple of Shingon Buddhism in Wakayama Prefecture. Located in the Tamanoura district, the westernmost part of Japan, close to China, Daiho-ji preserves cultural relics that highlight historical exchanges with the Kansai region and the Asian continent, including a five-storied pagoda from the Nanbokucho period (designated a Tangible Cultural Property by the city) and a Buddhist temple bell (designated a Tangible Cultural Property by the prefecture).
